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# Youth-led adaptation for climate change challenges in Vietnam: social action, intergenerational and intercultural learning

Youth working together in partnership, will be supported to identify imaginative ways to mitigate climate change challenges in the Red River catchment.

Youth will explore how local, traditional and indigenous knowledges can develop understandings and strengthen local and societal resilience.

Using a participatory action research approach drawing upon anticolonial methods, the project will result in innovative forms of knowledge exchange rooted in these diverse ways of knowing. Creating culturally-specific forms of affective and aesthetic expression.

- How do the different groups view/understand climate change?
- What is the impact of climate change on them? How are these impacts similar/ different?

#### AND IMPORTANTLY:

- What community assets exist already?
- What are people already doing to mitigate the impacts of climate change in their community?


### Storytelling

Story-telling and social justice – 'expands our imaginative capacity for how solidarity can be thought of and fostered' (Weatherall, 2019: 471)

They help emotional connection

Can foster dialogue

Stories often in firstperson narrative



Stories are important for social change as they are able to:

- Draw you in
- Communicate events from particular perspectives
- Avoid confrontation
- Activate people

(Gonzalez, 2020)

Can be a powerful tool that can be used to both advocate for others (to help communicate the stories of others) but can also be empowering for individuals and groups themselves to represent their own stories.
