



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

Purposes of higher education institutions in Wales & UK










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The two layers of autonomy






Necessary elements of effective autonomy

- 1 Clear legal definitions of roles
- 2 Experience and respect within membership of funding/regulatory body
- 3 Trust between all layers of autonomy, but with ultimate sanctions in place
- 4. Universities must be well-governed and well-led
- Transparency around funding performance-driven but strategic
- Government must respect principles of autonomy



Hidden dimensions...



- Delicate balance between Government priorities, arm's length Council, autonomous institutions and HE 'system'.
- ➤ HEFCW's legal powers to intervene derive force from being latent.
- Intervention may be a failure of regulation as well as a success.
- Reputation is a driver within the regulatory system.
- Partnership & trust across the various structures are vital ingredients.
- Continuous dialogue and early warning (both ways) is critical.

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Examples of HEFCW powers

Fair Access

Powers where institutions fail to meet general requirements of a Fee & Access Plan

Quality

Powers to intervene in relation to inadequate provision and provision likely to become inadequate

Fees

Powers in relation to excess fees

Financial Management Financial management code will make provision on transactions which will require HEFCW's consent, accounting and audit arrangements and information to HEFCW. Infringement may lead to intervention.



HEFCW – the Funding Council

Independent arm's length Council of 12 members

Council is subject to strict public funding rules

Distributes public funding for HE <u>provision</u> & research

Puts in place mechanisms for ensuring quality of education Members appointed by Cabinet Secretary after transparent process

Has broad legal duty to act as regulator of HE providers

Uses public funding to enhance access and participation in HE

Scrutinises financial assurance of institutions

Each member has specialist expertise or perspective

Must pay due regard to government priorities & annual remit letter from Cabinet Secretary

Regulates fees levels

Pays regard to the set of institutions as a <u>system</u>
